## Work Sheet for Planning a Troop Budget

On the other side of this is a troop budget form. To assist you in completing the troop budget, you might consider the following items

## **PROPOSED EXPENSES**

Troop Meeting Equipment (Do you need tools for handcrafts, supplies for the first aid kit, glue, arts & craft supplies)	\$
Troop Library (Which records or books might you need?)	\$
Program (Will you need money for service projects, troop camping activities, specific materials for badge work?)	\$
Special Events / Plans (field trips, troop events, host nation activities/events)	\$
Insignia (Will your troop purchase badges, insignia, patches, etc. for the troop?)	\$
Ceremonies (Investiture/Rededication; Court of Awards)	\$
Miscellaneous (allow some money for spur-of-the-moment ideas and unexpected opportunities or as a revolving fund to help new members unable to pay their full share)	\$

\*\*Troop Dues:

Often, dues will cover all of the troop's proposed expenses. To find out, divide the total amount of proposed expenses by the number of girls in the troop. Then, divide by the number of meetings. The answer is the amount of weekly dues from each girl. Troop dues are to be based on the plans of the girls and not an arbitrary amount set by the troop leaders. To do so then deprives the girls of the opportunity to make their plans based on sound and realistic expectations of being able to finance the activities themselves. Another question troop leaders need to ask is if each girl can pay the weekly amount of dues.

If the total proposed expenses are larger than the amount available from a realistic weekly troop dues, think about ways to reduce proposed expenses (i.e. scale back some of the more expenses activities) or make up the difference with a troop money-earning project.
