Bonn is located in the state of North Rhine–Westphalia (NRW) about 15 miles (24km) south of Cologne. From 1949 to 1990 it was the provisional capital of West Germany, and it served as the seat of the German federal government from 1990 until 2000, when the government completed its move to Berlin. The population is only about 320,000 but the city has a disproportionately high number of museums and cultural institutions due to its status as the capital city and as the birthplace of the composer Ludwig van Beethoven.

BEETHOVEN & HISTORY

Personally or virtually visit the Beethoven Haus (<u>https://www.beethoven.de/en</u>) and one of the following two museums which contains information about the history of Bonn and surrounding areas and complete this section on the next page by answering the questions about your visits.

- Haus der Geschichte (Museum of Contemporary German History <u>https://www.hdg.de/en/haus-der-geschichte</u>) covers German history and development since the end of the Second World War.
- Rheinisches Landesmuseum (Rhineland Museum <u>https://landesmuseum-bonn.lvr.de/en/ueber_uns/</u><u>ueber_uns_1.html</u>) focuses on the cultural history of the region with archeological artefacts and art.

- Deutsches Museum (German Technical Museum <u>https://www.deutsches-museum.de/en/bonn/</u> <u>information/</u>) contains exhibits of technical developments and science from the past century.
- Ägyptisches Museum (Egyptian Museum, part of the University <u>https://www.aegyptisches-museum.uni-bonn.de/visitor-information</u>) is a boutique museum offering fun activities for children.
- Bundeskunsthalle (Art and Exhibition Hall <u>https://www.bundeskunsthalle.de/en/about/</u> <u>bundeskunsthalle.html</u>) displays art from all time periods as well as culture, archaeology, and science.
- Bonner Münster (Roman Catholic Minster), one of Germany's oldest Churches.
- Altes Rathaus/ Marktplatz (Old Town Hall and Market Square).
- Poppelsdorfer Schloss/ Botanische Garten (Poppelsdorf Palace/ Botanical Garden, part of the University http://www.botgart.uni-bonn.de/o_inter/engl01.php).

Typical Foods of Bonn and the Rhineland

"Halver Hahn" does NOT mean a half of a chicken as the name suggest but rather a toasted rye roll with a thick slice of gouda as well as a sour pickle, mustard, and onions.

"Rievkooche" (or Reibekuchen), served with applesauce, is a deep-fried potato pancake made from shredded potatoes, onions, eggs and flour.

Himmel un Ääd ("Heaven and Earth") was already around in the 1700s and takes its name from the description of a potato as an "earth apple". Apples represent heaven and potatoes earth so Himmel un Ääd is mashed potatoes and applesauce. It is often eaten with Blutwurst.

A **Döppekooche** has potatoes in it (like many other typical dishes), along with onions, eggs, milk, bacon and raisins. It is backed like a cake.

Some Festivals in Bonn

The **Karneval** is not just the week prior to Lent; it actually begins on November 11 (11/11 at 11:11) and takes a break for Advent before going on again until Ash Wednesday, so you stand a good chance of attending one of the many events that take place in January and February including street parades, Sitzungen (shows you attend in costume), and sing-along concerts (<u>https://www.karneval-inbonn.de/start/Termine/index.htm</u>).

Rhein in Flammen takes place in early May and is a massive fireworks watched from aboard boats as well as from the shore in the Rheinaue Park.
