Paris Underground Quiz – Part III **ANSWER KEY**

- 1) To obtain limestone and gypsum to be used in construction
- 2) Yes, the Germans installed bunkers in an old quarry during World War II and the “Résistants” hid under the Place Denfert-Rochereau.
- 3) Not anymore but 100 years ago, they produced 25 tons of mushrooms per day. Today mushrooms are cultivated outside of Paris.
- 4) La Bièvre
- 5) It is not really a lake but a concrete basin that holds water because the Opera was built on marshy terrain.
- 6) Red: first class, Green: second class
- 7) The first metro starting running in 1900.
- 8) Métropolitain
- 9) Hector Guimard
- 10) There are still many such entrances left in Paris. There is an original one in Montreal and copies in Mexico City, Chicago, Lisbon, and Moscow.
- 11) The entrance is called the “Kiosque des Noctambules”. It is on line 7, station Palais Royal-Musée du Louvre, near the Comédie Française.
- 12) Pass Navigo
- 13) On line 6, between Bir Hakeim and Passy
- 14) The yellow rabbit speaks 5 languages: French, English, German, Spanish and Italian.
- 15) There are 16 lines: 14 main lines and 2 extra lines (3bis and 7bis).
- 16) A “station fantôme” is a metro station which was built but never opened to the public for either historical or commercial reasons. Porte Molitor/Murat is one of them; it was supposed to open near the Parc des Princes stadium.
- 17) Line 14 is the most recent; it opened in 1998. It is also called Météor. It is completely automatic and has no driver.



18) By rolling a large wooden ball to force the water down the siphons under the Seine. The workers also use sluice carts and sluice boats to flush the water through the sewers.

19) By boat. Since 1972, people can visit only certain parts of the sewers by foot on special walkways. For health reasons the boats are no longer used for the public.

20) The Catacombs were established at the end of the 18th century when the cemetery of the Holy Innocents, one of the largest cemeteries in Paris was closed for public health reasons. The bones from this cemetery and many others were moved to the abandoned Tombe-Issoire quarry.

21) The long bones and skulls are arranged in neat rows to form walls. Behind these walls the other bones are piled in a jumble. The catacombs hold the remains of an estimated 6 million Parisiens.

22) The Catacombs are 50 meters deep.

23) The Canal St Martin is 4.5 km long. It has 9 locks and 2 swing bridges.

24) Napoleon ordered the construction of the Canal St Martin; it opened in 1825.

25) Gallo-Roman vestiges, medieval cellars and foundations of streets and buildings were discovered in the crypt under the parvis of Notre Dame.

26) The crypt of Notre Dame is 117 meters long by 28 meters wide.

27) "Cataphile" is a French word to designate someone who likes to explore the quarries that are closed to the public in areas forbidden by the police (because they are very dangerous).

28) In the crypt of the Basilica of Saint Denis

- 32) Philippe Auguste built it to protect Paris from the English.
- 33) In the archeological crypt under the Parvis of Notre Dame
- 34) It was the original food market for Paris.
- 35) Est-Ouest-Liaison-Express. It is the part of the RER line E between Gare Saint-Lazare and Gare du Nord which was opened in 1999. It was one of the France's largest underground construction sites.
- 36) In the "Mémorial de la Déportation". The crystal points represent the 200,000 people deported from France to the Nazi camps
- 37) Hôtel de Cluny
- 38) It stands on the site of the old cemetery of the Holy Innocents.
- 39) Ménilmontant, l'Haÿ-les-Roses, Montsouris, St Cloud and Les Lilas.
- 40) Maison du fontainier
- 41) Some of Paris's quarries were also used to age cheeses or for wine cellars.
- 42) Bibliothèque François Mitterrand
- 43) It was built over abandoned gypsum quarries. This accounts for its steep hills and grottos.
- 44) A bell hole is an area where the ceiling of a quarry starts to fall down. If it is not reinforced it can cave in and cause the houses built over it to collapse.
- 45) In the late 19th century, Sir Richard Wallace financed the building of the fountains to allow poor people free access to drinking water.
